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## LETTER FROM LAURA

Dear All,

As I write this I am nearing the end of a three week chaplaincy placement at Harrogate District Hospital.

One difference between parish ministry and chaplaincy that strikes me is the balance between longer-term relationships and brief – but nevertheless meaningful – encounters. Within parish ministry there are



some spontaneous encounters, for example on the street, in the local café, in the shops, with visitors to the church or perhaps with those celebrating a family wedding or a baptism. However, much of the work in parish ministry involves the building of longer-term relationships; with parishioners, with teams and groups, with schools, community centres and with other

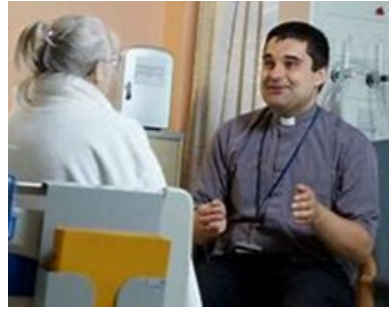
churches. Meanwhile, chaplaincy involves the nurturing of a few longer term relationships, whilst the bulk of the ministry is built from short encounters and chance conversations.

When we look back on our own lives so far, we can perhaps clearly see the golden strands of long-term relationship that thread right through; our families, friends, neighbours, church communities, school communities or colleagues. These relationships have a huge impact on us and are essential to our well-being. But what about those brief encounters, those ‘moments in time’ that add a rich array of small but colourful stitches to our existence, filling out the finer detail within the tapestry of our lives? Often we feel that these are less significant. Perhaps when we meet someone only briefly, when we are only a tiny part of a person’s story, we think we cannot possibly make a difference. But actually, most of our life is built up from these small moments and so they really do matter.



I can remember the chaplain who visited me briefly in the High Dependency Unit at St James’ Hospital in Leeds back in May 2006. I can’t remember his

name or his face, and I think he probably stood by my bed for less than ten minutes. But I can remember that his words were reassuring, and I still have the small wooden cross that he gave me. That chaplain is part of my story and he was a significant person on my journey to ordained ministry. But I am sure he doesn't know that. I was just one brief moment of time in his busy day 16 years ago, just one young woman who identified as Church of England but no longer went to church very often. He has no idea that the stitch he made on my life tapestry was to be a crucial one.



Then there was the lady in the canteen on my first day working as a nurse. I had selected my lunch and was at the cashier by the time I realised that I had left my purse on the ward. Feeling like a prize idiot, I was just about to walk back past everyone without my lunch when the lady behind me in the queue smiled kindly and insisted on paying for my soup and a roll. She probably doesn't even remember, but I definitely do.

I used to rather enjoy the season of Lent. I liked the simplicity, the stripping back of things that can often get in the way of my spirituality, and even the incentive to give something up and be more disciplined for a season. But I have to say, I have struggled more with Lent since Covid. So much has already been stripped away, and we have been required to exercise discipline in ways we perhaps wouldn't have chosen to. Perhaps you share some of those feelings? Another way of approaching Lent might be to actively seek opportunities for momentary encounters. Can you smile at someone in the coffee shop queue? Can you speak to someone you have never interacted with before at the school gate? Can you chat to the shop assistant and ask them how their day is going? Can you send a card to someone and share a few words of encouragement?



Who knows, God might use those brief moments of encounter to create a stitch in someone's tapestry that vastly improves the pattern, that adds a

unique vibrancy to that particular section of their story, that alters the entire direction of their life. Never underestimate the significance that a momentary encounter can have – small things truly can make a huge difference!

Some of you may have heard directly that Traidcraft has gone into administration. I attended an on-line meeting to hear more about the situation. Sadly, a combination of Covid and recession led to the Board accepting that they had to close the business because they couldn't afford to pay staff, and buy new stock. Many people have devoted themselves to Traidcraft, giving their time and money, so do pray for them, and for the board as they take difficult decisions.

Traidcraft had three different parts:

- the trading arm which is going into administration
- the fair trade charity, which supports small producers around the world and campaigns for fair trade – this was spun off last year and is now called Transform Trade. Transform Trade received a portion of the surpluses from Traidcraft, so they are now seeking additional funding. If you would like to support their work, you can do so at [Transform Trade \(transform-trade.org\)](https://transform-trade.org)
- the parent charity board, which may well continue. I've no doubt that God is at work in this and we can pray that new seeds are being nurtured for the continued work of trading fairly. We'll be kept informed as a church supporting Traidcraft.

### What does this mean for us?

**Fair trade stalls** – we have some stock, so Caroline Randall and I will continue to sell this in both churches. We have supplies of chocolate, dried fruit, nuts, sweets and a few gifts, so do support the stalls. We will be looking at other sources of fairly traded goods, and we will access Real Chocolate Easter Eggs, for example.

**Coffee supplies for church** – we have now accessed fairly traded coffee from Kingdom Coffee [Fairtrade Coffee - Kingdom Coffee](#) and we'll start using this in two or three weeks. Last year the Traidcraft stall made a small surplus of about £260 which contributed to the cost of coffee in our churches.



Traidcraft thanked all the fair traders who have supported them, and I pass that on to all of you who have supported the stalls, often over many years.



We hope to find new ways to enable us all to continue the work of ensuring all trade is fair, and God's justice prevails.

### **QUESTION CORNER**

Q. St Paul says in 1 Corinthians 14:34 'Women should be silent in church.' What are we to make of that?

A. He also adds 'Women should be submissive as the law says. If they want to know something, they should ask their husbands at home, for it is disgraceful for a woman to speak in church.' (If you say this to your wife, let me know how you get on!)



Paul became a Christian after a sudden conversion. But all his life he had followed Jewish laws and customs, and couldn't have changed the habits of a lifetime overnight. In his day Jewish women were regarded BY LAW as inferior, and were kept apart from men in worship. But, in time, Christian truths took over, and changed Paul. So in Galatians 3:28 he could say 'there is neither Jew nor Gentile, slave or free, male or female, for you are all ONE in Christ.' That's quite a turnaround for someone who has been taught in his prayers to thank God that he was not a Gentile, a slave or a WOMAN. And church customs evolved to reflect more Christian truths, especially when more Gentiles became Christians.

So how do we apply 1 Corinthians 14 etc today?

We don't, because Paul was expressing the Jewish culture of that day, before his ideas changed. Those who say that we should apply everything in the Bible literally (fundamentalists) try to use Paul's words as 'proof texts' to oppose women priests. Obviously we don't, since our curate is a lady – and who would want to bar or gag Laura? (that's a rhetorical question!)
