LETTER FROM JOHN

(retired priest, member of our church)

When was the last time you got lost? Not lost in Asda looking for the sugar, but really lost. Not knowing where you were or how to get out of that situation. With modern technology – SatNavs, apps, tracking devices etc – it is harder and harder to get lost, which is a good thing, although our daughters-in-law did manage to end up in Hawes when they were heading for Bedale!



But it occurs to me that a lot of the story of God's people is about them getting lost, or at least heading to an unknown destination. The people of Israel, wandering for 40 years in the wilderness; Ruth, finding a home in a foreign land; the disciples leaving the familiarity of their ordinary lives as they followed Jesus; Paul's travels as he brought the gospel to different communities. Even the Son of Man had nowhere to lay his head (Matthew 8:20).

But these are not stories of aimless wanderings. They are stories within God's greater purposes as He reaches out in love to the least and the lost, something which we should be doing as individuals and as congregations.



For the last few years Val and I have been running Thirst, a weekly coffee morning in the Dene Park Community Centre just off Woodfield Road. It's a provision that was started by Karin Shaw and continues to this day. Thirst provides a place to talk, to welcome, to encourage and to pray for a largely elderly group of people. We have seen numbers slowly grow to around 30 each week and once a month we have Thirst Table, a light meal after the coffee where we also try to include a Christian message.

We haven't felt that Thirst Table was hitting the spot of late but also felt moved by God to consider providing some form of worship in that part of the parish. Our plans have now crystallised into what we are calling Monday First, a service on the first Monday of the month (see what we did with the name there?!). Together with a wonderful team who have volunteered to help we intend to explore God's love through discussion, prayer and

creative activities. And tea and cake! We are going to leaflet the area and see who comes along. Each month will have a theme such as Harvest or Remembering. The PCC are generously supporting us in this and we hope that you will include this new venture in your prayers.

Don't get the idea that we are calling Dene Park a wilderness. The wilderness connection is that we are heading out into a new area, led by the Spirit, and waiting and watching to see where we end up. God is not a static God. He is at work in us and our communities and longs for us to travel with him, not as

people who are lost but as those who travel in expectation.

May we all be blessed as we travel together.

QUESTION CORNER

Q. Holy Communion is a memorial to Jesus's death. Should it not be a quiet and reverent service? And is it suitable for children?

A. Certainly there are times when we should be quiet, as when we confess our sins, and reverently focussed on the death of Jesus. He said 'Do this in remembrance of me', but 'remembrance' in the original text (ANAMNESIS) is not just a bare memorial. It's recalling the past in the present to remember that Jesus is present with us, as he promised. So the service is a memorial of his death but also a celebration of his





resurrection. We worship a RISEN Saviour, so we want to express our joy (yes, even by singing a bit noisily sometimes!) Small children can't fully understand the real meaning (can ANY of us?) but they can begin to see that Jesus is our friend who gives us new life. They should be welcome, and there are things they can join in quite easily. Personally I think they add sparkle – bright sparks!

For various reasons some of us need a quieter or earlier service. This is provided at 9 am on Sundays, at St John's (and the congregation at 10.30 on Wednesdays are not that noisy either!)

The first Christians were Jews who kept Saturday, the Sabbath, as their holy day. Then, as people from other countries joined the church, the chief holy day became Sunday, because Jesus rose from the dead on the first day of the week. So we continue to keep Sunday as a 'mini-Easter' day of resurrection. That's a reason for joy, even if we choose to worship quietly.

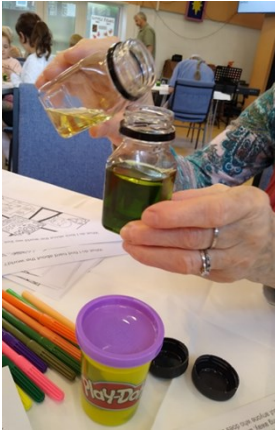

listening to superb

teaching, doing sports, playing games, going to silent discos, eating lots of donuts and crêpes and praying. In fact, prayer was the theme of the week, and every day we learned about a different type of prayer, and then we practised on each other! We practised prayers for healing,

intercessions, singing prayers and speaking in tongues!



There are too many amazing stories to write about here, but one stands out: we were there at the time of the riots in August, and if you remember, there was one night when the police and authorities were expecting there to be another night of violence, and then, amazingly, the next morning there hadn't been any more riots! Well, that night, all 6500 of us had spent the evening praying for peace in our towns and cities; crying out to God for an end

to the violence; for hearts to turn from hatred to love. Teens from all the affected towns and cities were invited up on stage to pray for their town. They prayed very simple but heartfelt prayers and we all felt the presence of God through the Holy Spirit. I am certain that God answered those prayers that night



and that's why there were no more riots.

Please do continue to hold up in prayer the young people who went, that the seeds sown during Limitless Festival will grow and mature; for them to be bold and courageous when they get back to school in speaking about their faith; and above all, that they would grow in love for Jesus. **Emma**

NELLIE WELLS



Nellie Horner was born on the 18th October 1929 in Halifax, being one of ten children of a local farming family just outside Rastrick, Brighouse. Her early life was dedicated to the local brownie and guide groups, becoming a brown owl.

On the 27th of July 1963, Nellie married Jack Wells at Crowtrees Methodist Church in Rastrick, with a full guard of honour from the local guides and brownies.

In 1964 Jack got a new job as a carpet representative for Kosset Carpets and the family moved to Grosvenor Road, Bilton. Nellie soon became a part of the Bilton community, being a regular member of the congregation at St John's, where she enjoyed many events at the Church Hall, including weekly badminton sessions, jumble sales and the annual garden party. She was a member of the Parochial Church Council, and became their secretary.

When their son David joined cubs, Nellie became involved with the running of the 3rd Harrogate Scout Group, using her typing skills to act as the Group's Secretary for many years, displaying a dedication to scouting which led to her being presented with the Medal of Merit Award from the Scout Association, in recognition of her many years' service.

She made many friends through association with the Church and the Scout Group, in particular Moira Morton, Mollie Wilkinson and Mary Dawson, and their families.

Bilton Cricket Club, being a short walk from the family home, became a favourite haunt of Nellie and Jack. There they would enjoy a drink and a cigarette with friends including Doreen and Peter as well as fellow scouter and

congregation member Jack Tyler and his wife Barbara.

Following a decline in Jack's health, they moved to Sowerby, Thirsk to be nearer David. Jack died in 2003, and Nellie managed to live independently till 2022 when it became necessary for her to move into a Care Home in Northallerton.

Nellie fondly remembered her times in Bilton and regularly talked about the people already mentioned and many others. The family send their thanks to all

those who kept in contact. She loved to receive the magazine monthly, and as a family we thank the team for keeping that up after Cedric could no longer continue forwarding a copy.

Nellie passed away peacefully on 26th July. She was cremated at Maple Park Crematorium, Thirsk on Wednesday 14th August. An interesting fact is that Maple Park is half a mile away from where Nellie's parents got married in 1914 at the Church of St John the Evangelist in Skipton-on-Swale.

(Nellie maintained her interest in Bilton, continuing to receive the Parish Magazine even through Covid. We'll miss her cheery messages of thanks - Ed)

PART OF A LETTER FROM CHRIS & ANNA HEMBURY, **OUR MISSION PARTNERS IN HULL**

The majority of our work as CMS mission partners in Hull has been working either for or alongside Hull YFC. Chris led the team for 18 years and it has been a safe setting in which to pioneer most of the mission “itches” that we felt compelled to “scratch” in service of the gospel for our neighbourhood, including the Breakfast Club, community meal, Orts, Matt’s House and Circuit Breaker. This year marks 30 years of Hull YFC’s work in the Boulevard area of Hull.

In 1994, Hull YFC’s trustees took the courageous decision to move away from its mainstay of supporting churches in their youth work and youth events, to establish a radical incarnational ministry on the Boulevard, a particularly deprived part of the city. A small team of four, sharing one minimum-wage salary, did the essential groundwork for everything else that followed – building relationships with children and young people, wrestling with what new monasticism might look like here, trying to get embattled churches to engage with the local community differently, sharing the good news that each person here was loved and had a place in Jesus’ resurrection story.

In many ways we have simply been doing the same thing (without having to share our salary!). Those that started this before us did the really hard bit. With the ground prepared, we have been able to plant and propagate and provide a trellis for stuff to be supported as it grows. Thirty years on (27 for us), we can see what has flourished as well as what never took or had to be uprooted in its time. We give thanks for countless breakfasts, youth clubs, trips out, camps, doorstep chats, cuppas and community meals. For the steady growing of connection that has allowed people to find themselves in community with each other. For bravely reimagining church and spiritual formation and faith expressed in living differently. For the young people over the years who found a faith and a love they could live within, and who can confidently share that with others. One of those people is Nicky, who pretty much grew up in this garden. Nicky is now part of the leadership team at camp, supporting young people in their development, sense of self and faith formation.
